It's been another busy few months on EnergyConnect with our teams continuing to hit milestones and work collaboratively

with our construction partner to deliver Australia's largest transmission project. Construction activities are now complete on the first 330kV transmission line, from the SA border to Buronga. Commissioning is underway at Buronga substation, and assembly of the first 500kV towers has commenced.

We have had the chance to host the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner which was a great chance to showcase some of and our community engagement activities firsthand.

I was also fortunate to get out on country recently for a workshop with some Indigenous Elders to better understand the importance of protecting Aboriginal culture.

We are looking forward to announcing the recipients of our latest round of Community Partnership Program funding.

Thanks again to our teams for all their efforts over the past quarter and thank you for your continued support as we continue to delivery EnergyConnect.



## **Project update**

Construction continues to progress on the 700km NSW section of EnergyConnect, with key milestones being achieved in the following areas:

## **EnergyConnect West - South Australian and Victorian borders to Buronga**

EnergyConnect has reached a major milestone with the construction completion of Line 1, stretching 135km from Buronga in south-western NSW, to the South Australian border.

This line includes:

- 1366 concrete foundations
- 291 towers
- 1900km of conductor cabling

The next step will be energisation of Line 1 which is planned for August.

Stringing works are continuing on Line 4, a 220kV line from Buronga to Red Cliffs in Victoria.

## **EnergyConnect East - Buronga to Wagga Wagga**

Construction works continue to progress on both Line 2 from Buronga to Dinawan (Bundure) and Line 5 from Dinawan to Wagga Wagga. Over 300 foundations have now been completed on Line 2 with 151 towers assembled and 66 towers erected around the township of Euston.

Tower assembly is underway on the first 500kV towers from Dinawan to Wagga Wagga. 179 tower foundations are now complete with foundations and assembly continuing to progress down the line.

Steel for the towers is supplied to each location in bundles and assembled into tower sections on site. These sections are lifted by a crane to form the completed tower.

Construction of the Cobb Highway Camp 40 kilometres south of Hay is also underway with early works including constriction of access roads, earth works and vegetation clearing. Occupancy of the camp is expected in the final quarter of 2024. For more information on construction activities see our <a href="Cobb Highway">Cobb Highway</a>. Construction Notification

#### **Fun Facts**



The 1900km of conductor cabling strung on Line 1 from Buronga to the SA border is the equivalent distance of driving from Sydney to Brisbane and back again Steel for the towers is supplied to each location in bundles and assembled into tower sections on site. These sections are lifted by a crane to form the completed tower.



## **Substation Update**

Works are continuing to progress all three substation sites across the 700km alignment at Buronga, Dinawan (Bundure), near Coleambally and Wagga Wagga.

### **Buronga Substation**

Testing and pre-commissioning works of key pieces of equipment are underway within the substation including offline testing of the synchronous condensers which have been assembled at the site. Offline testing will ensure that the condensers operate safely and effectively prior to being connected to the grid. These condensers will play a vital role in maintaining grid stability and enabling the sharing of energy between NSW, SA and VIC.

#### **Dinawan Substation**

Workers are moving into the accommodation camp at Dinawan (Bundure) near Coleambally which has the capacity to house up to 460 workers. The 1.5ha camp site which opened in June has facilities including a laundry, kitchen, dining room, games room, spiritual room and gym as well as a water treatment plan. Works on the substation site are continuing with the substation bench works progressing well.

### **Wagga Substation**

Construction activities are underway including drainage, civil works and earthing continuing.

#### First Legacy 100 participants graduate at Buronga ceremony

Sixteen participants from the Legacy 100 program have completed their training and have celebrated with a graduation ceremony at the EnergyConnect project site at Buronga.

This first cohort of graduates have now gained valuable qualifications, knowledge and experience in building high-voltage electricity towers and lines.

Another 33 participants are currently at various stages of their training under the Legacy 100 program which allows participants to earn while they learn and gain a Certificate II in Transmission Line Construction.

Transgrid and its EnergyConnect construction partner Elecnor Australia launched Legacy 100 last year as the nation's first training initiative to boost skills in the power transmission sector across regional NSW.

The Legacy 100 graduates have diverse backgrounds ranging from the fitness industry, classical music, retail, sheep shearing, mining, carpentry, and logistics, also come from various locations.

Legacy 100 will result in up to 100 candidates completing qualifications in Transmission Line Construction as part of the \$1.8 billion EnergyConnect project.

## In the community

#### On Country - EnergyConnect East

EnergyConnect team members recently engaged in an immersive on-Country experience led by local Wiradjuri Elder Uncle James Ingram and Mark Saddler, on the sacred lands of the Wiradjuri people around Lockhart.

The team spent the day exploring significant sites to foster and understand the processes to protecting Aboriginal cultural heritage on Country. The immersion deepened the team's understanding on how they can minimise their footprint and impacts, as EnergyConnect activities ramp up on the eastern section of the alignment.

In May, our team had an isolated find when they came across a flaked river cobble along one of the project easements. The artefact was able to be salvaged before clearing activities and will be repatriated once construction activities are complete.



Most recently we got the opportunity to support our delivery partner Elecnor Australia at the Cobb Highway camp cleansing ceremony, located 40km south of Hay. The winter sun was shining as Wiradjuri Elder Michael Lyons hosted a Welcome to Country and cleansing for the teams and the camp.
